English 11 Questions to ask during revision

These questions were taken from Monica Wood's book, The Pocket Muse 2.

- 1. What interests you most in this draft? Why is it so interesting?
- 2. Is the main character sympathetic? If not, are the character's motives and actions at least recognizable, understandable, plausible?
 - 3. Do we have enough information about the character and his/her circumstances, or does the draft seem to be hiding the heart of the matter?
 - 4. Conversely, do we have too much information and not enough implication?
- 5. Do you believe in this world you've created?

Five more questions to ask during revision:

- 1. Is your language carefully crafted, or are there areas where the words lose precision?
- 2. Does the dialogue illuminate character and advance the story?
- 3. Is the point of view consistent?
- 4. Is the point of view well chosen?
- 5. If you've come up with a clever or unusual gimmick (e.g., a surprise narrator, a reverse chronology), does the piece subsist on its own, beyond the gimmick?

Five more questions to ask during revision:

- 1. Do factual inaccuracies rob the draft of authority?
- 2. Similarly, does incorrect punctuation, spelling, or usage rob the draft of authority?
- 3. Does the piece bog down with unnecessary "business", such as introductions, or hellos and goodbyes?
- 4. Does this draft seem the right length for its breadth and depth?
- 5. Are you ready to identify that one nettlesome worry that has troubled you just under the surface while writing this draft?

Five more questions to ask during revision:

- Does this draft have a beginning, middle, and end?
- 2. Do scenes flow logically from one to another?
- 3. Is there a missing scene?
- 4. Is the ending too rushed or, to the contrary, too slow?
- 5. Does the ending leave you with too many questions to be able to say what the piece is about?
